Meology

Victoria Osteen, wife of Joel Osteen and co-pastor of the Lakewood mega church, has once again stirred up controversy. In a sermon she delivered in August, she said the following:

"When we obey God, we're not doing it for God. . . . we're doing it for our self. Because God takes pleasure when we're happy. Do good 'cause God wants you to be happy. When you come to church, when you worship Him, you're not doing it for God, really. You're doing it for yourself because that's what makes God happy."

As soon as her sermon hit the internet, Christians took to social media to express their dismay at her comments. But what is the real problem with her comments?

One could point to this idea that God's chief task in the universe is to make and keep us happy. She doesn't define what she means by happy, but she does buy into the concept that God guarantees us health, wealth, and smooth sailing. And if we are happy in that sense, God is happy too. How anyone can honestly read the Bible and believe that is beyond me. The Bible presents us with people of faith who have difficult lives in being faithful to God. God never promises us happiness in this life in the sense she understands it. In fact, just the opposite. Jesus is very clear about the difficulty we may experience in taking up our cross and following Him in our lives.

One could question her understanding of worship as finally not being about God, but rather worship as a way of gaining something for oneself. What does God want from us? In worship the focus is on God: who God is, what God does, and what God will do in the future. We should leave self-interest at the church door; we are there to acknowledge the greatness and glory of God.

I believe the real problem here underlying all the others is that she is caught in the spirit of our age — a wide spreading narcissism. A narcissist, based on the Greek myth of the youth Narcissus who fell in love with his own reflection in a pool of water, sets the focus not only on the self, but the self is placed at the center of life, and others, even God, exist for the convenience of the individual. Instead of theology (the study of God) we are given Meology (the study of me, it's all about me).




